**MEDIEVAL MEDEA: LEGENDS OF
A BAD WOMAN TRANSLATED AS GOOD**

This program will eclipse mythology and academic studies of women in medieval literature. It will focus on versions of the Jason and Medea myth included in the encyclopedia of women during the years of 1361-1405, written by Giovanni Boccaccio (Italy), Geoffrey Chaucer (England), and Christine de Pizan (France).

Presenter: *Dr. Eva Jones* is a faculty member of the English Dept. and Faculty Program Coordinator of the Honors Program at MxCC. She teaches all levels of English available at the college. Dr. Jones earned her PhD in English and a certificate in Women's Studies from U of Rhode Island, her MA in English Education from Teachers College, Columbia U, and her BA in English from Western CT State U. She studies the ways in which the literature of late medieval Europe serves as a historical resource for women.

**ON FREEDOM'S SHORES:
Book III of the Unbroken Circle**

Dr. Triay's most recent book of fiction, *On Freedom's Shores*, concludes his critically-acclaimed trilogy *The Unbroken Circle* which focuses on a Cuban family caught up in Castro's Revolution. During this presentation Dr. Triay will discuss the trilogy with special emphasis on *On Freedom's Shores*. He will also discuss Operation Pedro Pan, during which over 14,000 Cuban children of parents who opposed the revolution were airlifted to Miami and later relocated with relatives, friends, foster care, or group homes in numerous states in the United States.

Presenter: *Dr. Victor Triay* has a BA from the U of Florida and an MA and a PhD from Florida State U. He has been an MxCC professor for over 20 years. He is the author of three nonfiction books: *Bay of Pigs: An Oral History of Brigade 250; Cuban Revolution: Years of Promise; and Fleeing Castro: Operation Pedro Pan and the Cuban Children's Program*. He has also written three works of fiction in *The Unbroken Circle* trilogy. He is a popular MILE presenter.

MON, SEP 29

BLUESGRASS: ACOUSTIC DUO MUSICAL PERFORMANCE

The acoustic duo **BluesGrass** features guitar, harmonica, and upright bass with two lead singers and strong harmony vocals. The duo plays Bluegrass, blues and an "Americana" mix of roots music including folk, early jazz, and pop music oldies from the '50s and earlier. They also provide informative historical background on the music they play. The 90 minute musical concert (ending at 3:00 PM) will feature music interspersed with information on the songs as well as opportunities for questions from the audience.

Presenters: *Jon Swift* has played upright bass for 35 years and sung for many more, including choral singing, barbershop quartets, folk music, blues and bluegrass. He was a founding member of the bluegrass band Traver Hollow and played and sang with them for 13 years. That band did a European tour as well as sharing the stage with many giants of bluegrass and acoustics here in the U.S. Prior to that Jon played with John Herald, lead singer for the Greenbrier Boys. *Mark White* has been playing guitar since the early '60s. He discovered bluegrass music during college and began playing acoustic with various bands, interpreting the songs of the bluegrass pioneers. Mark has a deep appreciation for the many facets of American roots music and searches for songs that resonate with him and his listeners.

MON, OCT 6

LINEAGE SOCIETY PROGRAM, WADSWORTH CHAPTER, DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Join members of the Wadsworth Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution in discovering lineage societies and their role in genealogy. The lecture will cover the definition of a lineage society, basic rules for applications, the essence of the Daughter of the American Revolution, and the ways in which a lineage society can help you trace your family tree. Attendees are encouraged to bring questions to the program.

Presenter: Ellen Halstedt spent 28 years as a police officer in New Jersey and South Florida. She has a 2 year degree in Criminal Justice and was also an adjunct professor at the Palm Beach Community College. She is presently retired and has been a member of the Wadsworth Chapter DAR since 2005.

AN ADVENTURE WITH VENTURE SMITH

The program will be an illustrated look at the life and times of Venture Smith (1730-1805). Born in Africa, the son of a king, Venture was captured and sold into slavery in 1739. His autobiography was published in New London, CT, in 1798 and is the basis of a Power Point presentation illustrating the dramatic events of his life story.

Presenter: Kevin J. Tulimieri is a graduate of the U of Hartford. He first published writings on Venture Smith in 1995. His research on Venture Smith and his gravestone was published in *Venture Smith and the Business of Slavery and Freedom*, edited by James Brewer Stewart, U of Massachusetts Press, 2010.

GHOSTS OF THE MARK TWAIN HOUSE

This program will give us a look at the claimed haunted happenings in the Mark Twain House in recent years. The hauntings will segue into Twain's own interest in ghosts and spiritualism. The presentation will feature some PowerPoint illustrations followed by a group discussion on many other aspects of the Mark Twain House, including Twain's family life there and the literary works he produced while living there.

Presenter: Steve Courtney has been a journalist for nearly 40 years. For the past five years he has worked at the Mark Twain House both in publicity and in special projects. He is the author of three book including *We Shall Have Them with Us Always: The Ghosts of the Mark Twain House* (Paige Typesetter Press.)

LEGENDARY LOCALS OF MIDDLETOWN

Come learn about some of the legendary people who have lived in Middletown. The class will be an illustrated presentation of the Hubbards' book *Legendary Locals of Middletown*. There will be time for questions and answers as well as a book signing.

Presenters: Robert and Kathleen Hubbard were both born in Middletown and went to schools in Middletown. Robert is an Associate Professor of computer information systems at Albertus Magnus College. He also teaches courses in the college's Master's writing program. Kathleen is a retired Middletown school teacher. Together they wrote the book *Images of America, Middletown* in 2009, and Robert wrote the book *Images of America, Glastonbury* in 2012.

GARDENING TO ATTRACT BIRDS AND BUTTERFLIES

POETRY AND HAUNTING

What does it mean "to haunt?" To be "haunted?" Reading an excerpt from *Hamlet*, as well as poems by Edgar Allen Poe, Wallace Stevens, and Rae Armantrout, this class will look at how content and language work together to create very different kinds of hauntings, each one guaranteed to set your Halloween a little bit on edge. The format of the program will be lecture, but the lecture will be rooted in audience participation.

Presenter: Terry McNulty is a Professor of English at MxCC. He previously taught at the U of Maine and at Elmira College. He also taught at the REACH Alternative High School in West Hartford and at Central High School in Providence, RI. He has a BA in English and Philosophy from the U of Scranton, an MA in English from the U of Maine, and an MA in Education from Brown U. He is a popular MILE presenter.

Presenter: *Susan Kulesza*, a recent retiree and MILE member, learned to play Mexican Train Dominoes almost ten years ago and has been “spreading the word” about the game ever since then. ARTISTS FOR WORLD PEACE FOUNDATION

Wendy Black-Nasta started an international foundation in 2003, Artists for World Peace. She would like to share what she and other international artists are doing to change the lives of people around the world. She will be returning from Tanzania in late August, and she will show us a DVD of some of the work the Artists for World Peace Foundation has accomplished there in the past six years. She will also give us a broad view of the foundation’s work. There will be ample time for questions and answers.

Presenter: *Wendy Black-Nasta* has been an international jewelry designer since 1977. She is based in NYC’s diamond district and has designed jewelry for Saks Fifth Avenue, Macy’s, museums, and hundreds of other stores around the world. In addition Wendy spent ten years designing sacred objects for Buddhist Monasteries as well as churches in Hong Kong. She now designs one-of-a-kind pieces for art collectors in the U.S. and Europe.

BEATLES: BAND OF THE SIXTIES

Explore the music of the Beatles which will include history and musical analysis. We span the full 1960’s beginning with the band’s seminal visits to Hamburg, through the Beatle mania years and concluding with *Abbey Road*. Presenter: *Aaron Krerowicz* graduated from the U of Hartford with a degree in music composition. While still a student, he won a research grant to pursue connections between the Beatles and mid-20th Century avant-garde art, now presented as lectures at the Hartt School at UH and the College Conservatory of Music at the U of Cincinnati. Aaron was a featured speaker at Penn State at the “International Beatles Conference.”

TOUR OF THE STATE PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY

Elise Kremer and other managers at the State Public Health Laboratory will provide an orientation to the laboratory and a physical tour on-site. We will discuss the design and development of the facility and the functions that it supports. The following will be described: the various programs, which include laboratory testing for newborn screening, infectious diseases, testing of environmental samples for both biological and chemical contaminants, and testing of human specimens for various environmental toxins. Also featured will be an explanation of how the laboratory’s testing programs support the mission of public health by enhancing disease surveillance and control at both the state and federal level, as well as monitoring of the quality of the environment. The tour will be interactive with questions and discussion welcomed. (Travel details after lottery.)

Presenter: *Elise Kremer, PhD* is a manager who has worked for the Dept. of Public Health for 30+ years. She is the Operations and Administration Chief of the Public Health Laboratory. She manages the staff and day-to-day operations of this major branch of the Department of Public Health.

NOTHING TO ENVY (ORDINARY LIVES IN NORTH KOREA)

This nonfiction book is a very close look at real people who have tried to live decent lives in a totalitarian state that has actually become harsher over time. Their valiant and resourceful efforts to maintain their lives and honor the “Dear Leader” are remarkable. Demick interviewed North Koreans who had escaped to the south when she was stationed in Seoul for the *Los Angeles Times*. Her North Korea reporting won the Overseas Press Club Award for human rights reporting, the Asia Society’s Osbourne Elliot Award, and the American Academy of Diplomacy’s Arthur Ross Award.

Moderator: *Kathy Amoia* has a BA in Social Studies from The College of Mount Saint Vincent and an M.A. in Elementary Education from Wagner College. She is retired after teaching 31 years in the NYC Public School System. Presently she is President of the Killingworth Foundation and a volunteer at the Killingworth Library circulation desk. She also writes book reviews for the *Killingworth Krier*.

SPACE EXPLORATION

The first part of this presentation will feature the highlights of the ISDC Conference which includes commercial space progress, Russian technology, dependency & political problems as well as other topics.

The second portion of the program will focus on a review of the NSS Space Commercial, Space X successes, and long term goals to colonize Mars and much more.

Stevan Akerley is a retired engineer who has an AA in Liberal Arts from Orange Coast College, a BS in Industrial Technology from UCLB, and an MBA in International Business and Information Technology from the U of Hartford. Our presenter, Klaus Gumz, was born and raised 30 miles from the Baltic Sea but never got to see it until early 1945 when it was used as an escape route from the advancing Soviet Army. A cruise vacation to the countries of the Baltic Sea in 2013 passed close to his home, formerly Germany but now part of Poland, and the trip sparked a new interest in the region of his origin. As an avid photographer, Klaus has attempted to capture the beauty, history, and essence of the various countries and cities visited which include Oslo, Norway; Copenhagen and Aarhus, Denmark; Warnemuende, Germany; Tallinn, Estonia; St. Petersburg, Russia; Helsinki, Finland; and Stockholm, Sweden.

Presenter: Klaus Gumz has a bachelor's degree from UCONN. He worked at Pratt & Whitney for 33 years as a Project Engineer before retiring. At PWA he was part of a team to establish a digital image management system. Photography and travel have been a lifelong hobby. Klaus continues to be an invaluable member of the MILE A/V support team.

FLORAL DESIGNS

Come and enjoy a demonstration of a variety of floral arranging designs for fall holidays (Halloween and Thanksgiving) for dining room tables, porches, and other appropriate spots inside homes. The program will begin with an overhead projector overview, followed by demonstrations and opportunities for participants to ask questions, make adjustments to designs, and actively participate. There will be a drawing at the conclusion of the program for the arrangements. Winners will take all of the plant material and containers home with them.

Presenters: Duane Luster is a retired pharmacist who attended UCONN School of Pharmacy. He worked in local Hartford and Wethersfield pharmacies. *Alice Luster* is a graduate of Hartford College for Women and the U of Hartford. She is a retired Special Education teacher who taught in Bloomfield and Glastonbury. She now works for CCSU, USJ, and CREC with teachers seeking Special Education certification. Both *Duane and Alice* are accredited National Garden Club Flower Show Judges. They are members of the Country Gardeners of Glastonbury. They judge as well as create floral designs for flower shows, and they also create designs to accompany works of art for special museum events at venues such as the New Britain Museum of American Art and the Florence Griswold Museum.

The program will give an overview of the Connecticut Small Claims Court process, combining lecture and a PowerPoint look at the CT judiciary website. There will be ample time for discussion and questions and answers throughout the presentation.

Presenter: Benjamin Boutaugh spent 14 years as a licensed attorney in the State of Connecticut. His focus area was general practice, including litigation, probate, workers' compensation, and creditors' rights.

MEXICAN TRAIN DOMINOES

THU, OCT 9

THE STEALTH INVASION: HOW NON-NATIVE SPECIES ARE TAKING OVER THE LANDSCAPE

They have marched across Connecticut virtually unimpeded: invasive plants such as bittersweet, autumn olive and barberry that blend right in while quietly crowding out and strangling native vegetation. They irreversibly change native ecosystems and permanently alter the landscape. We will examine Connecticut before the invasion, look at how the invaders became entrenched, and consider their far-reaching impacts. We will also look at other types of invaders advancing on Connecticut as the climate changes and glimpse what the future may hold, including possible solutions such as eating the invaders. An optional walk (weather permitting) will follow the talk and take us across campus to see the invasion up close and look at what the MxCC community is doing to fight the problem.

Presenter: Professor Christine Witkowski has a BS in Biology and an MS in Geology from UCONN. She was the park naturalist at Dinosaur State Park and a founding member of the CT Geological Society and a field trip leader. She has been an adjunct instructor at a number of colleges in the Northeast. She is presently an Associate Professor of Environmental Science and the Coordinator of the Environmental Science Program at MxCC. She is a favorite MILE presenter.

THU, OCT 16

OPERA: DER ROSENKAVALIER

Barbara Arafah, local opera expert, will introduce us to Strauss's comic opera *Der Rosenkavalier*, that also operates at a deeper level, musing over the passing of time, growing old, and men's inconstancy. During this program, we will listen to arias from the opera, view some of the scenes on DVD, and become familiar with the plot of the opera. *Der Rosenkavalier* will be presented at the Middletown Performing Arts Center on Sunday, November 9, 2014 at 3:00 PM.

Presenter: Barbara Arafah has a Bachelor's in Music with a major in voice from the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. She has an MA from Columbia U in NYC. She studied opera with the eminent Boris Goldovsky. Barbara is the President of the GMAC, which sponsors operas at Middletown High School. She is a popular MILE presenter.

The content will examine both the myths and realities of trusts as they pertain to income and estate taxation, probate issues and gifting. TUE, OCT 28
CHINA: AGGRESSIVE NATIONALISM VS
POPULAR DEMOCRACY

This program will reveal several dilemmas in China's development strategy. These dilemmas will include the issues of sovereignty in the South Seas and Central Asia; the rise of a middle class that incubates protest and creativity but is also held in ransom by being represented in the Communist Party; the crises in its economic development in terms of class inequities, corruption, and decline in trade; and its questionable global role in the environmental issues of climate change. The question for the class will be: What is the role of American diplomacy in the face of these challenges?

Presenter: Dr. Richard Kagan received his PhD from U Penn. He taught East Asian history for many years at Hamline U in St. Paul, MN, where he was chair of the History Dept. More recently he has taught history and East Asian Studies at Wesleyan. During his academic career, he also taught courses in the history of the Vietnam War and the dilemmas of American foreign policy. In addition, Dr. Kagan has written several books on Taiwan and Korea and has published many articles, book reviews and discussion papers on the politics, culture, and society of East Asia.

UKRAINE AND TAIWAN: ISSUES OF SOVEREIGNTY
AGAINST IMPERIAL POWERS

Russia and China are both engaged in reviving their empires. The accession of Crimea and the pledge to take Taiwan by force if necessary have rekindled the imperial fires of expansion and claims to old territory. We tend to think the main purpose is economic nationalism – Crimea is a valuable port; Taiwan is rich in human capital. But there are darker motivations including the extension of territory for criminal gangs, the goal to create new geographies of power (trans Russia and trans China), the spread of new technologies to limit the behavior and power of

GEOPOLITICS OF IRAQ NATION BUILDING

FIGHTING SMOKE WITH FIRE:

How "old technology" is finding a new purpose.

Lung cancer accounts for 30% of death from cancer in the U.S., with a five-year survival rate of about 15%. However, for Stage 1 lung cancer the five-year survival rate exceeds 60%. Although the CT scan has been around for many years, Middlesex Hospital is using this technology in a brand new way to "aim and fire" at early stage lung cancers. This program will discuss the important need for identifying early stage lung cancer and the way in which the Total Lung Care Center at the hospital is helping to save the lives of current and former smokers, including our veterans. Discussion will also include the concerted efforts being made on the part of care providers to secure reimbursement for the procedure from the federal government for Medicare patients.

Presenter: Gean Brown, MSN, RN, OCN is the Clinical Manager at the Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center. She is an oncology certified nurse, who holds a chemotherapy/biotherapy certificate, with a strong outpatient medical oncology background. She holds an MS in Nursing from Sacred Heart U, and a BA from the U of New Haven, has published extensively, and lectured widely about the field of oncology nursing. She is presently program chair for the Central CT chapter of the Oncology Nursing Society.

CHALLENGES AND DISCOVERIES FOUND RESEARCHING WOMEN

In this presentation, Stelzer paints a picture of life for women in early New England by telling some of the stories of the dozen women profiled in her book. She will explain how she used probate records to confirm some of her conclusions and share some discoveries along the way that surprised her. There will be time for discussion, questions, and answers regarding women's history.

Presenter: *Alice Plouchard Stelzer* has been writing for over 25 years as a magazine and newspaper editor, a publisher, a columnist, a journalist, a public relations consultant and author. Alice has also been a mentor/coach for writers and has taught writing workshops on journaling, creativity, autobiographical writing, writing for health, and writing family history. Since the publication of her book *Female Adventurers: the Women Who Helped Colonize Massachusetts and Connecticut*, Stelzer has been lecturing on the challenges faced when researching women.

From conservation issues, to symbolism to archeological adventures, you are sure to leave this program with a new thought or two about the old burying grounds near you.

Presenter: *Ruth Shapleigh-Brown* is the founder and Executive Director of CGN since 1993. She has been on the board of directors for the Association for Gravestone Studies, the VP of Friends of Center Cemetery, Inc., consultant to the Ancient Burying Ground Association, and Chair of the Monument Review Committee at Cedar Hill Cemetery. She worked with Dr. James Slater of UCONN, author of two books about early gravestones. Ruth has been awarded many certificates and awards for her work on gravestones and burying grounds in CT. She is also affiliated with several genealogical and historical organizations and works closely with our state archeologist and the professional genealogist of CT.
